#### 4: NORMANDY PALACE – PRIVATE USE July 27 – Aug 03

From the Norman invasion of England in 1066 to the D-Day landings of 1944, Normandy has long played an outsized role in European history. This rich and often brutal past is brought vividly to life by the spectacular island monastery of Mont St-Michel; the Bayeux Tapestry, world-famous for its cartoon scenes of 11th-century life; and the cemeteries and memorials along the D-Day beaches, places of solemn pilgrimage. Lower-profile charms include a variety of dramatic coastal landscapes, lots of pebbly beaches, some of France's finest museums, quiet pastoral villages and architectural gems ranging from Rouen's medieval old city – home of Monet's favourite cathedral – to the maritime charms of Honfleur to the striking postwar modernism of Le Havre.

One highlight is a visit to Villers Brettoneaux where on April 24 1918 two brigades of the First Australian Imperial Force recaptured the town from the Germans at a cost of 1200 Australian lives – the town has never forgotten the sacrifice. The Australian War Memorial in France is located just outside Villers Brettoneaux and in front of it, is the graves of 770 Australian soldiers.



The estate consists of a 21,500-square-foot (2,000 m<sup>2</sup>) Château, fully renovated in 2014-2016. An 18th-century hunting lodge, fully renovated in 2014-2015. Farm buildings, A walled orchard and a 125-acre (50-hectare) park: woods, ponds, numerous deer, rabbits and birds. Our chateau consists of 16 Bedrooms and Ensuites with an additional 2 Bathrooms for our Bridge play.

Two years of renovation have made this Chateau its splendor by reinvigorating its historical elements and giving it contemporary comfort and unique assets. The rooms and suites have king size beds and en suite bathrooms paved with Paros marble floor to ceiling. The garden level is an extravagance, with professional demonstration kitchen, swimming pool (10x3 meters), marble jacuzzi, projection room, saunas, underfloor heating. In the park of 50 hectares, a swimming pool of 20x4 meters.





## Tours Include: 1) Le Mont Saint Michelle



It's one of France's most iconic images: the slender spires, stout ramparts and rocky slopes of Mont St-Michel rising dramatically from the sea – or towering over sands laid bare by the receding tide. Despite huge numbers of tourists, both the abbey and the narrow alleys below still manage to transport visitors back to the Middle Ages. The bay around Mont St-Michel is famed for having Europe's highest tidal variations; the difference between low and high tides – only about six hours apart – can reach an astonishing 15m. The Mont is only completely surrounded by the sea every month or two, when the tidal coefficient is above 100 and high tide is above 14m. Regardless of the time of year, the waters sweep in at an astonishing clip, said to be as fast as a galloping horse. If you have fitness issues you can see the island by “horse & carriage”

## 2) D-Day Beaches Tour.



Code-named ‘Operation Overlord’, the D-Day landings were the largest seaborne invasion in history. Early on the morning of 6 June 1944, swarms of landing craft – part of an armada of more than 6000 ships and boats – hit the beaches of northern Normandy and tens of thousands of Allied soldiers began pouring onto French soil. The majority of the 135,000 Allied troops who arrived in France that day stormed ashore along 80km of beaches north of Bayeux code-named (from west to east) Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno and Sword. The landings on D-Day – known as ‘*Jour J*’ in French – were followed by the 76-day Battle of Normandy, during which the Allies suffered 210,000 casualties, including 37,000 troops killed. German casualties are believed to have been around 200,000; another 200,000 German soldiers were taken prisoner. About 14,000 French civilians also died.



### 3) Bayeux Tapestry.



The world's most celebrated embroidery depicts the conquest of England by William the Conqueror in 1066 from an unashamedly Norman perspective. Commissioned by Bishop Odo of Bayeux, William's half-brother, for the opening of Bayeux' cathedral in 1077, the 68.3m-long cartoon strip tells the dramatic, bloody tale with verve and vividness.

### 4) Guided tour to Rouen.



With its soaring Gothic cathedral, beautifully restored medieval quarter, excellent museums and vibrant cultural life, Rouen is one of Normandy's most engaging destinations.

The city has had a turbulent history. It was devastated by fire and plague several times during the Middle Ages, and was occupied by the English during the Hundred Years War. The young French heroine Joan of Arc (Jeanne d'Arc) was tried for heresy and burned at the stake in the central square in 1431. And during WWII, Allied bombing raids laid waste to large parts of the city, especially south of the cathedral.



After departing our Villa in Normandy we take a scenic drive to one of our favourite cities.

### 3: BRUGGE – BELGIUM – HOTEL JAN BRITO AUGUST 08 - 11

If you set out to design a fairy-tale medieval town, it would be hard to improve on central Bruges (Brugge in Dutch). Picturesque cobbled lanes and dreamy canals link photogenic market squares lined with soaring towers, historic churches and old whitewashed almshouses. And there's plenty of it. To really enjoy Bruges, you must stay overnight (day trippers miss the fabulous evening floodlighting) and its best to visit midweek.



Nestled in the heart of Bruges is the 16th century, 4-star Hotel Jan Brito, a short stroll from Burg and Market Square. The historic hotel has a peaceful courtyard, a bar with a fireplace, and breakfast is served in the Baroness' former library. The Jan Brito's grand rooms are fitted with air-conditioning, cable TV, en-suite bathrooms and free wifi. Hotel Jan Brito won 2 Haute Grandeur Global Hotel awards 2016, they won Best Family Hotel of Belgium and Historical Hotel of Belgium.

### Sunday Aug 08 INVERNESS - SCOTLAND: -



Inverness is a city on Scotland's northeast coast, where the River Ness meets the Moray Firth. It's the largest city and the cultural capital of the Scottish Highlands. Its Old Town features 19th-century Inverness Cathedral, the mostly 18th-century Old High Church and an indoor Victorian Market selling food, clothing and crafts. The contemporary Inverness Museum and Art Gallery traces local and Highland history.

### Monday Aug 09 EDINBURGH - SCOTLAND: **Guided Tour Included**



As the capital of Scotland, Edinburgh's dramatic architecture, elegant squares, and grand buildings, make this city rich in culture and history. Visit the medieval and reformation-era buildings of the Old Town, or view the world's finest examples of Georgian structures in the New Town. There are several museums to take advantage of, including the five National Galleries that hold seasonal exhibitions, ancient portraits and paintings, and various works of photography. Enjoy a panoramic view of the city on Arthur's Seat, a legendary volcanic formation atop the hills of Holyrood Park. Edinburgh Castle stands as a dominant figure of the city's skyline, and is the Scotland's second most popular landmark.



**Thursday Aug 12 BELFAST, NORTHERN IRELAND -**



Belfast is Northern Ireland's capital. It was the birthplace of the RMS Titanic, which famously struck an iceberg and sunk in 1912. This legacy is recalled in the renovated dockyards' Titanic Quarter, which includes the Titanic Belfast, an aluminium-clad museum reminiscent of a ship's hull, as well as shipbuilder Harland & Wolff's Drawing Offices and the Titanic Slipways, which now host open-air concerts.

**Friday Aug 13 LIVERPOOL, ENGLAND**



Liverpool is a maritime city in northwest England, where the River Mersey meets the Irish Sea. A key trade and migration port from the 18th to the early 20th centuries, it's also, famously, the hometown of The Beatles. Ferries cruise the waterfront, where the iconic mercantile buildings known as the "Three Graces" – Royal Liver Building, Cunard Building and Port of Liverpool Building – stand on the Pier Head.

**Saturday Aug 14 DUBLIN, IRELAND**

**- Included tour with guide**



Dublin, capital of the Republic of Ireland, is on Ireland's east coast at the mouth of the River Liffey. Its historic buildings include Dublin Castle, dating to the 13th century, and imposing St Patrick's Cathedral, founded in 1191. City parks include landscaped St Stephen's Green and huge Phoenix Park, containing Dublin Zoo. The National Museum of Ireland explores Irish heritage and culture.

**Sunday Aug 15 Cork, Ireland**

**- Guided Tour Included**



Cobh serves as the gateway to Cork, which is approximately 15 miles away. There is a train service from the port of Cobh to the center of Cork. Shop for Irish linen, tweeds, hand-knit woolens and Waterford crystal along Patrick Street, or try some Irish soda bread at a local pub. Visit St. Finbarr's Cathedral or the Fota Wildlife Park, located just outside town.

**Monday Aug 16 Guernsey, Channel Islands - Guided Tour Included**



St. Peter Port is situated on a hillside overlooking the harbor of the Island of Guernsey. Rows of brightly painted houses, granite stairs and cobbled lanes climb the hill, providing great views of the port and the medieval castle. Visit Victor Hugo's house. The author made this seaport his home for 14 years.
